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BWT Awaits Green Pennant Award DecisionBy Peter Willson

The Green Flag Award Scheme is the benchmark of excellence for parks and green spaces based on a national standard in the UK.

This award is for community led projects. It recognises all the work that volunteer groups do to protect their open spaces and the work carried out by all involved.

Awards are given on an annual basis and winners must apply each year to renew their green flag status. It is realised that all green spaces are different and this diversity is welcomed, with each site being judged on its own merits and suitability to the community.

Our inspection was carried out on 28 April with many criteria which were judged. The tour was conducted by Peter Willson, Jeff Winn and Dave Johnson. Later questions were also asked regarding the many areas of our volunteers' work, from memberships to land management and even the editorial team received special mention from the judge!

All visits of the near 1,300 sites around the country will be completed by the 10 June, with the awards scheduled for announcement at the end of July during Love Parks Week. Once the awards have been announced, the public will be able to vote for the People's Choice Award. Voting for the People's Choice will close at the end of September and the overall winner will be announced at the beginning of October 2011. Once again, BWT will be in need of the

voting power of its supporters. Look out for guidance nearer the time. Hopefully by the end of the summer we will proudly be flying the flag of excellence!

BWT ENHANCING THE LIVES OF LOCAL CHILDREN

As a key part of their science and environmental studies, more than 80 pupils from three Year 2 Classes (age 6-7 years) from Thurnham Infants School visited BWT on 30 March.

After a welcome and introduction, the children were taken round the site in class groups.

Judging by the show of hands, more than 90% of the children told us they had already visited the site, some on a regular basis. This is very heartening for us all.

As always, the children were very enthusiastic and interested in the numbers and types of trees, the animal burrows (and droppings!) and also the way BWT re-uses its natural materials around the site. They were struck by the fact that some trees were very old, but others were planted less than seven years ago - some after their own date of birth. The bonfire heap was also a source of interest ("Is that where you cook your dinner?")

The Thurnham School tree on Oak Avenue was soon found after a short search.


The children counted the steps down to the Lilk Stream bridge (always a competitive exercise!) but the favourite activity was to stand shoulder to shoulder around the "President's Tree" beyond Gore Cottage. They were amazed it took more than half the class to do this!

They later walked back via the Manning Maze, always popular, and several demonstrated their skill.

"I come every week," said one boy who arrived at the centre long before anyone else.

They all enjoyed the visit, thanked us cheerily on the day, and sent us some lovely letters of appreciation.

We look forward to seeing next year's class groups; BWT is an important part of their future.



MANAGING FARM WOODS FOR WILDLIFE

Several of our volunteers, including our Life President Peter Willson and Environmental Consultant Sharon Bayne, attended a Wildlife Seminar day at East Malling Research on 4 November 2010. The event was the culmination of a two-year project funded by the Esmee Fairbairn Trust and fronted by Bearsted Woodland Trust, involving 10 other wildlife and environmental organisations.

The objectives were to learn about "best practice" in managing our site, especially the woodland, in order to enrich ecology and wildlife, which is one of BWT's long-term aims.

The morning session involved talks by experts on the evaluation of woodland areas for wildlife; birds and butterflies of farm woods; living landscapes, and how best to manage them.

The booklet which accompanied the

BWT has also been host to recent Easter celebrations with the annual local churches' egg hunt and the joint churches Easter service. It's great to see different parts of the local community getting so much use and value from the site.



seminar summarised a number of case histories, including BWT's "People's Wood" planted in 2004, and now developing well with a variety of densely-planted trees gradually providing ground cover for insects, beetles and other wildlife.

The afternoon session took the form of a woodland visit to Comfort's Wood, near Cranbrook. Despite the persistent rain, our group were able walk around the woods, which were sown using different techniques in 1990 (tree planting and direct seeding) and 1991 (broadcast sowing of oak and hazel). The differences were very clear to see, the former being lighter and more open, the latter very dense and dark, with very little other vegetation able to survive.



The day was very useful, and we now see why it is necessary to "grade" the areas around our woodland so that the edges go from tall trees, to shrubs and leaving an area of longer grass in order to encourage different plants and wildlife, which depend upon each other. BWT Members will hopefully see some subtle changes in our maintenance patterns and a gradual enrichment of wildlife over the next few years.

Keep looking, and tell us if you spot anything unusual!

A WOODLAND ROYAL WEDDING

Bearsted celebrated the Royal Wedding on 28 April in style with a congregation of hundreds of local adults and children for a truly memorable family picnic on BWT.



The day was the brainchild of local mum, Lynne Spears, who soon found able and willing volunteers in Lisa Felstead and Rhonda Moore and 'dab hand' local event organiser, June Wilkins. The group managed to source all manner of equipment from other local organisations as well as printing 3,000 invitations at a minimal cost, which were then distributed to all the local schools.

Jubilee Church joined forces to provide a number of fun activities on the day, including running races, football and rounders.



Arts and crafts tents were led by young volunteers Rachael Knatchbull and Annie Savage with an enthusiasm that kept the children coming back for more all day long. Other activities included a treasure hunt, face painting and tattoos; all at no cost to the grateful recipients.

The WI provided a refreshments tent, where such low prices were causing people to refuse their change and the ice cream man donated 20% of his profits.

Donations were gratefully received from Holy Cross Church, the Parish Council and BWT also donated towards the event. Together, with the church bells rung beautifully by the Holy Cross campanologists, all helped to make it a thoroughly enjoyable and memorable day.



PROJECTS AND MAINTENANCE

There were 3 main areas of work during the autumn and winter:

(i) Removing and replacing a number of dead trees around the trust. Some had succumbed in the very dry weather but the water bowser has proved very useful and has helped to reduce losses. The severe snow and icy conditions in November and December 2011 affected some smaller trees but losses were surprisingly few.

(ii) Now that the tractor barn is fully operational, the annual service of the tractor and the overhaul of the flail attachment were able to be done 'in house' by volunteers, instead of sending it away. This has resulted in a considerable financial saving.

(iii) Project work included the fencing near the Church Landway entrance; construction of hard surfacing at the entrance to the Children's Play Area (which BWT carried out as a goodwill gesture for Bearsted PC); and installation of a much needed cut-off drain in the bellmouth area of the Church Landway entrance. Several over-exuberant dogs (and one or two owners) had their footprints set in concrete around the

drain edges, Hollywood-style!

At the time of writing the only work remaining other than routine summer maintenance is the refurbishment of the gate and fence between the Elizabeth Harvie Field and Church Meadow; BWT offered to do this for Bearsted Parish Council.

Finally, we are very pleased to welcome three new volunteers to the maintenance rota. They are Marie-Anne Harstad, Jackie Greig and Mike Henderson. With all 16 of last years volunteers 'signed up' for 2011, the mowing rota now totals a very healthy number of 19. All are working to the more environmentally-friendly regime for summer maintenance (less mowing, enriched longer-term ecology) which was explained at last year's AGM.

New volunteers (male and female) are always very welcome, so please come along to the tractor barn if you can.

COMMUNITY TREE AND HEDGE PLANTING IN OCTOBER / NOVEMBER

Plans are now in place for this large project in late autumn. It will be along the Ashford Road from the Gore Cottage entrance right across to Roundwell, shielding the whole area from the Ashford Road.


It is proposed that we will be planting some 4,000 specimens of hawthorn and blackthorn, hazel, holly, field maple, Guelder rose, wild cherry etc. These will be planted with a view to layering in about five years time from 60cm bare root hedging.

It is also proposed to add hedgerow trees every 50m which will be allowed to grow naturally. Pauline Moore thought it would be a good idea to start the project in her lifetime so that it will be well established when her bequeathed land eventually passes to BWT.

This will be a community-led project headed by a team from BWT and, hopefully, involving at least a hundred volunteers of all ages. Funding so far has been pledged from several areas
